- Extension site of Patten University (1996 2020).
   Independently accredited by ACCJC in January 2022.
- Entirely volunteer faculty; cost of attendance (tuition and school supplies) is free.
- Offers AA degree in Liberal Arts, including pre-college courses in writing and math.
- Operates solely inside San Quentin.
- Accepts anyone with GED, HS diploma, or equivalent.







#### Overview

- Student services is a critical underpinning of successful, intellectually rigorous, and inclusive colleges.
- MTC's student services division shares commonalities with traditional colleges and has unique aspects due to its setting and student population.
- What we learn may apply to both traditional colleges and other colleges that operate in prisons.



# Services We Provide: Advising and Student Services

- Academic Advising;
- Education Planning;
- Transfer Planning;
- Review of MTC academic policies;
- Referral of students to appropriate MTC resources or staff;
- Referral of students to appropriate external resources.

# Services We Provide: Learning and Development

- Evaluation for learning disabilities;
- Academic accommodations;
- Strategizing with students and faculty to improve learning outcomes;
- Support faculty with universal design and curriculum differentiation;
- Providing student, staff, and faculty trainings on various topics.



# Student Services: How does this look different in a prison setting?

- Limited access to technology (website access, email, tech support);
- Challenging communication logistics (prison mail);
- Gaps and trauma in many students' educational histories (Introduction to College);
- Student experience of trauma in prison and the effects on learning.



# Student Services: How does this look different in a prison setting?

- Prison rules about relationships ("over-familiarity," physical contact);
- Uneven student access to campus (student movement to and from campus, lockdowns, quarantines, administrative segregation);
- Noisy, chaotic study environment;
- Need for very close collaboration with academic team;
- Collaborate with academic team to address challenges that accompany the regular changes in the faculty pool.

#### Services We Provide: Alumni Affairs

- Maintain relationships with alumni;
- Provide connection to organizations for reentry needs;
- Assist in identifying resources for continued education;
- Provide job referrals;
- Fulfill transcript requests.



# Alumni Services: How does this look different in a prison setting?

- Serving the unique needs of both incarcerated and released alumni;
- Focusing on re-entry and other services, along with building community and alumni networking;
- Implementing "inside" and "outside" events, to bring outside resources and paroled alumni inside;
- Challenging and time-intensive logistics for workshop and event planning.

# CHALLENGES FOR FACULTY TEACHING INSIDE

- 1. Fear/anxiety about interacting with incarcerated students
- 2. Navigating lockdowns, entrances and exits
- 3. Adapting course materials/andragogy
- 4. Limited technology/Canvas access

#### PREPARING FACULTY TO TEACH INSIDE

- 1. Bi-Weekly Rising Scholars faculty meetings
- 2. Shadowing onsite by Dean of Rising Scholars and two Faculty Coordinators
- 3. Pre-visit to facility: classroom tour, meet the Warden and PSCEs, learn about chips
- 4. PD workshops on Trauma-Informed Education
- 5. Compensation for course adaptation

#### COMPENSATION FOR RS FACULTY

29.3.B. Faculty assigned to teach in correctional facilities shall therefore be *compensated for an additional 1 hour per visit* to a correctional facility work assignment, to be paid at the appropriate Category 3 rate as a lump-sum stipend at the end of the semester of the assignment.

**29.3.C.** Adapting a course for instruction within a prison or correctional facility requires faculty to revise instructional materials. Continuing faculty shall be paid a *stipend of \$650.00 per class* for the time necessary to make these revisions.







A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi.





**Enrollment** 






#### **Student Success**


Student success rate, AY 2017-2023









#### Challenges



- Classroom space
- Pay differential
- Staffing
- Competing with workline
- PEP process
- Just the normal incarcerated day-to-day... lockdowns,
   discipline, ACOs, movement restrictions...
- Non-Pell eligible students



#### **Next steps**





- PEP process: keep on keeping on
- ACOs: State funded certificate in trauma-informed care offered free of charge, online, asynchronous
- Trauma informed care trainings for staff
- Cultural protocol to be developed for staff onboarding and support
- Scholarship fundraising for Pell non-eligible
