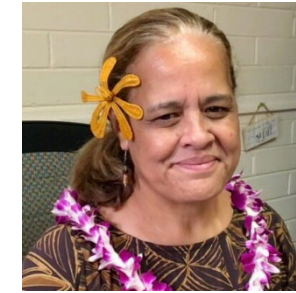
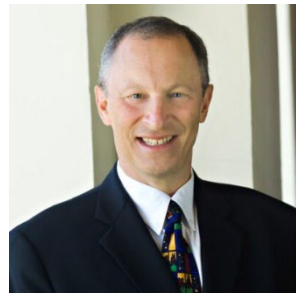

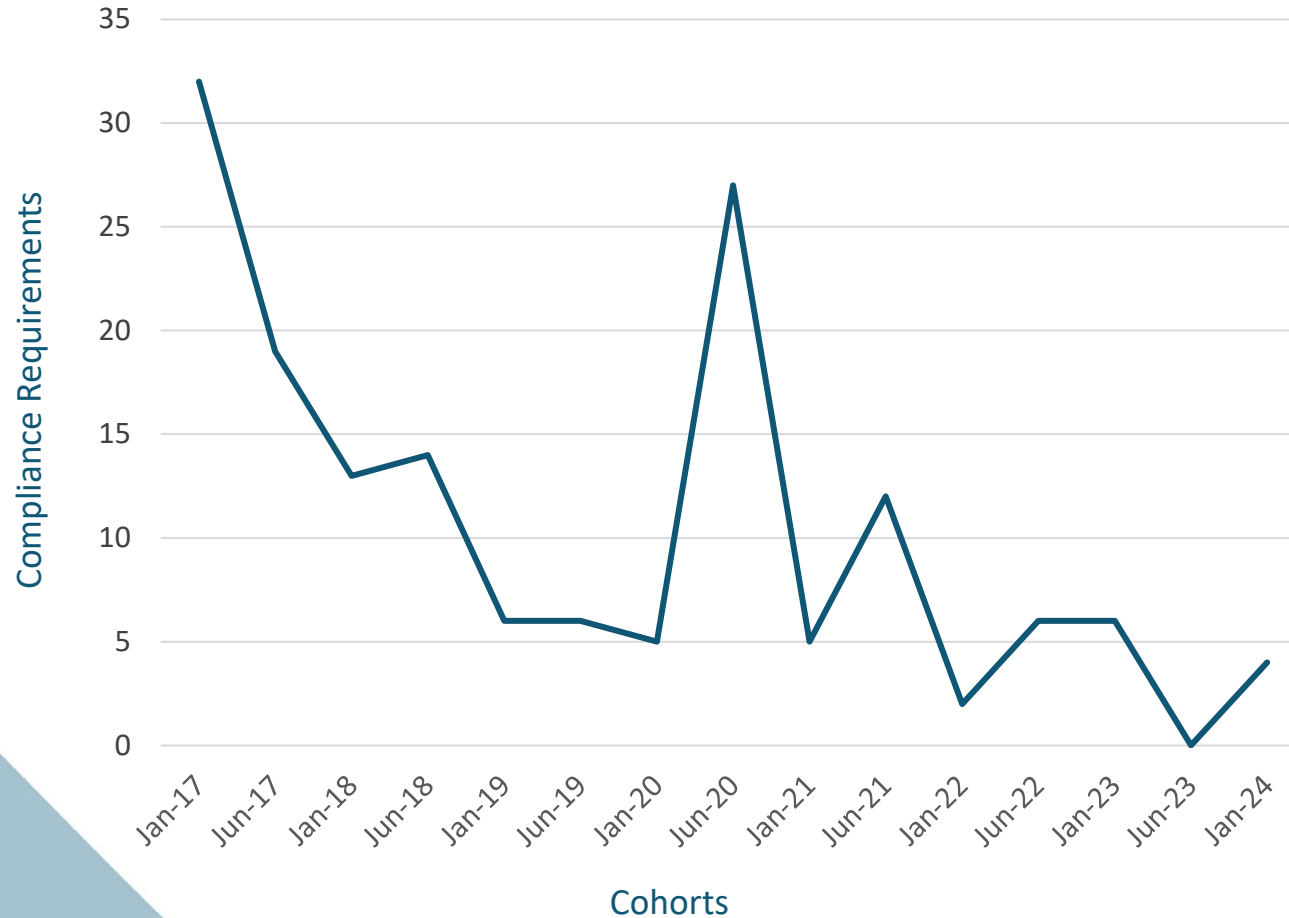

Impact of Portfolio and Formative/Summative Models



Notes:

January 2017 – 17 of the 32 Compliance Requirements came from one college.

June 2020 – In a cohort of 11 colleges, 15 of the 27 Compliance Requirements came from just two colleges.

June 2021 – Ten of the 12 Compliance Requirements came from one district.

January 2022 – First Formative/Summative pilot colleges.

June 2022 – Second Formative/Summative pilot colleges.

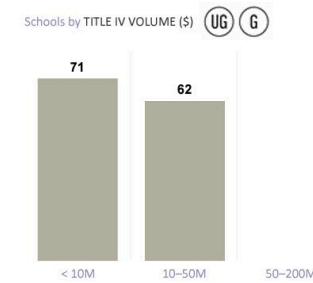
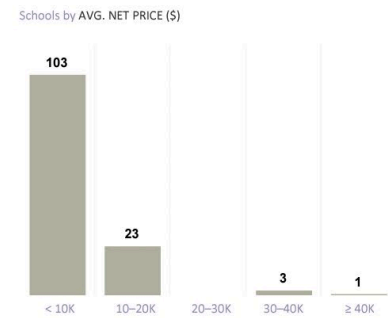
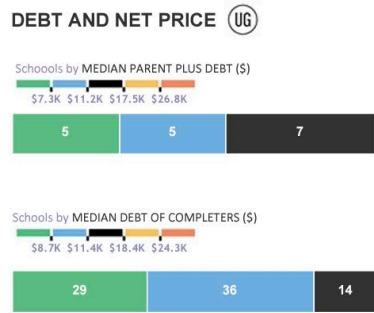
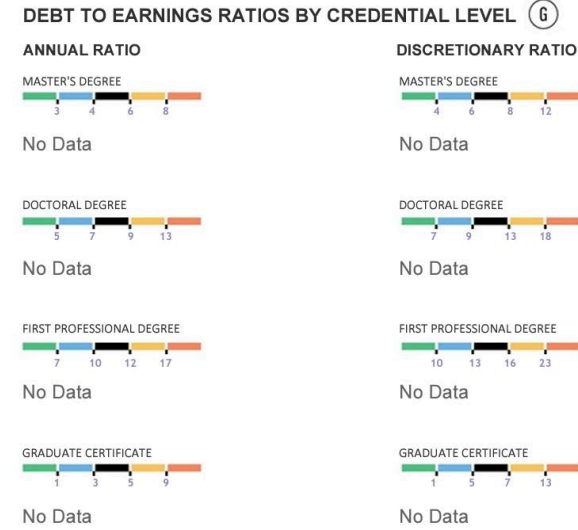
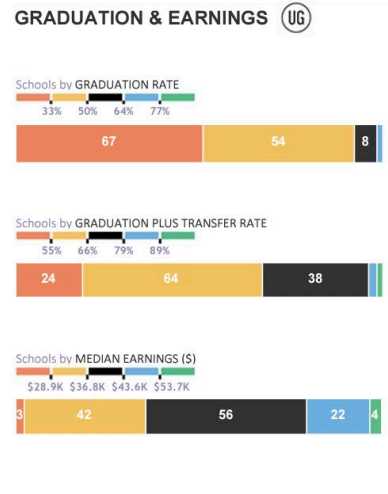
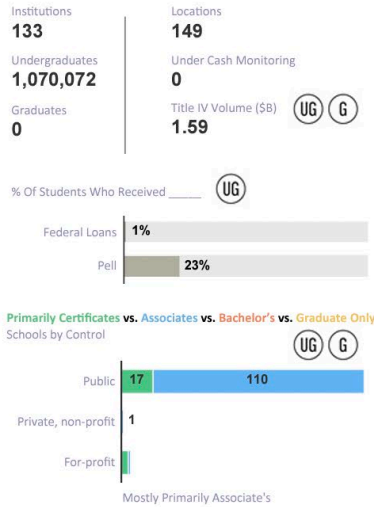
January 2023 – All colleges Formative/Summative. All six Compliance Requirements came from one college.

Outcomes

- From our 2023 Annual Report Data, ACCJC institutions' course completion rates throughout membership remained flat (at 72%) and yet college stretch goals increased by 1.3%.
- Over the last three reporting years ending with 2021-2022:
 - Certificates awarded increased by just over 10% exceeding aggregate stretch goals.
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 - Associate degrees awarded stayed mostly flat, however college stretch goals increased by almost 16%.
 - Bachelor's degrees awarded increased by just over 44% with a total of 359.
 - Transfer volume decreased by just over 10% with a reported total in 2021-2022 of 104K.
 - Licensure Pass Rates (even through COVID years) have remained flat at 84%

Outcomes *continued...*

- Over the last three reporting years ending with 2021-2022:
 - Job Placement rates fell by 2.6% for the last three reporting years, however, the gap closed slightly as of the most recent reporting year. Current reported placement rates are 75%. During the same period, credit enrollment fell almost 14%.
 - Since COVID, the number of students taking at least one fully online distance education course increased from 41% to 74%.
- Total certificates as of 2021-2022 were 106K and the stretch goal was 105K.
- Total Associate degrees conferred as of 2021-2022 were 177K.

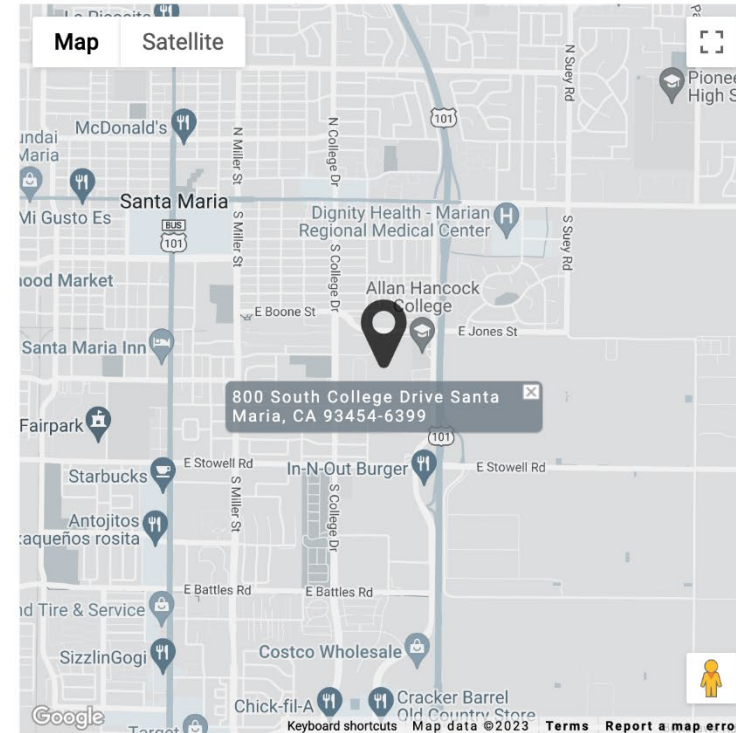

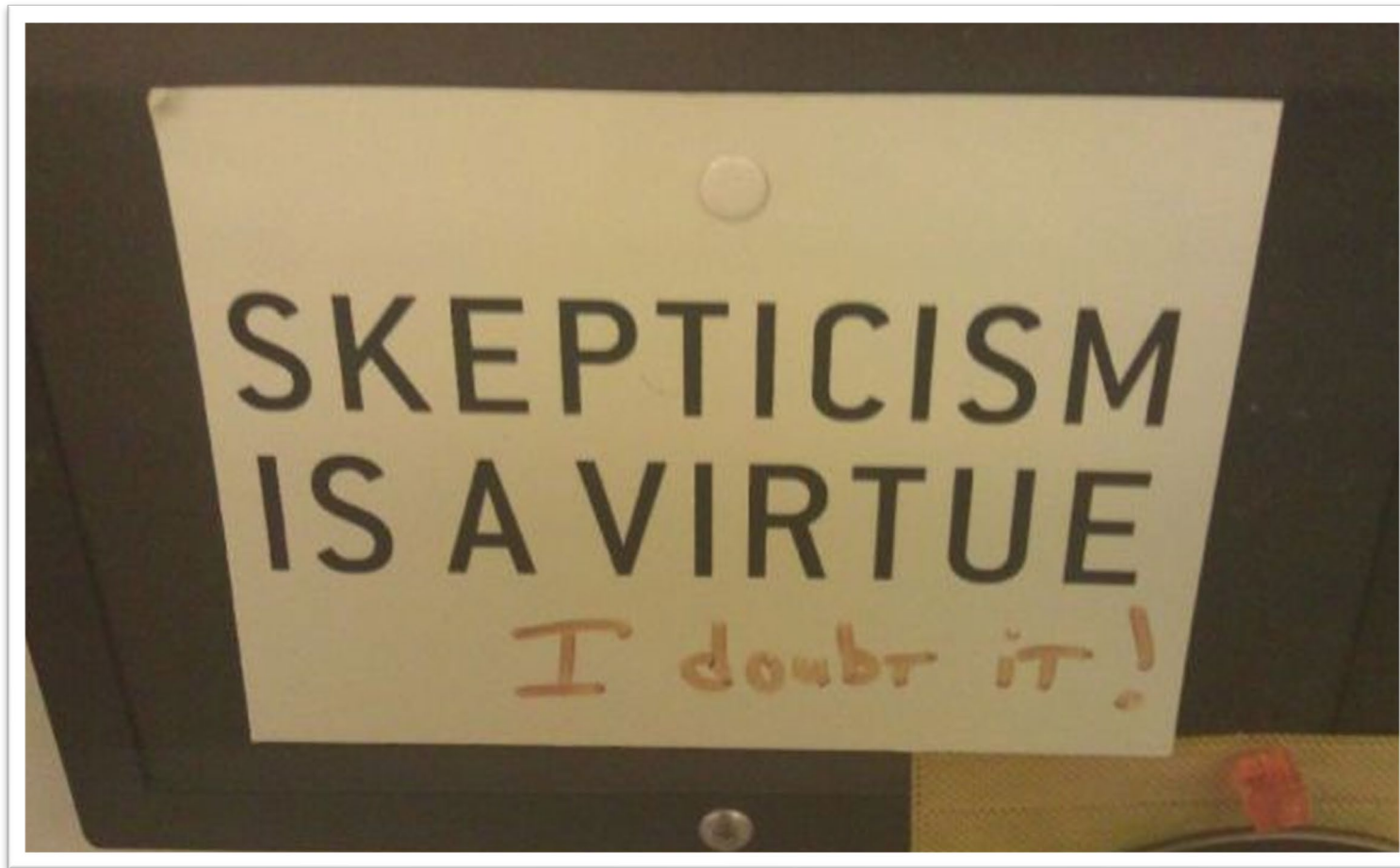
